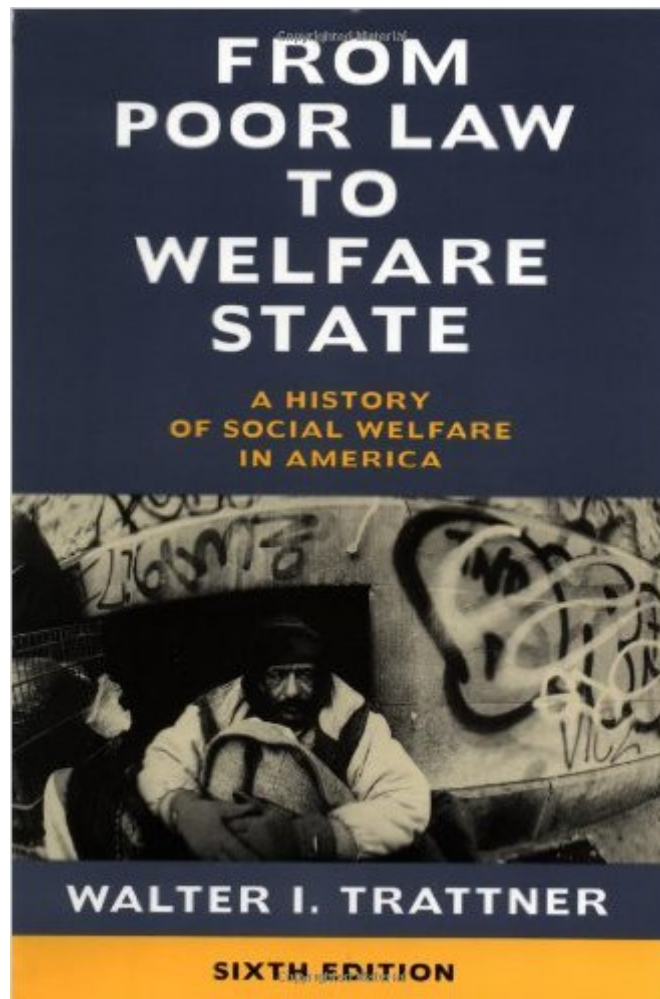


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From Poor Law To Welfare State, 6th Edition: A History Of Social Welfare In America
